## **Course Description Grades 11-12 Advanced Placement Literature and Composition**

**Philosophy Statement:** God is the Supreme Communicator and has spoken to His people in many ways. In His goodness, He has gifted us with the ability to read, write, listen, and speak. These language arts are the foundation and gateway to all learning and life skills. Students become life-long learners about God and His Word through the study of language arts.

**Course Objective:** This class focuses on the critical reading of the various genres of literature. Students will develop their abilities to read, analyze, and interpret a variety of short stories, novels, poems, and plays (mostly British and American) written over a period of time that dates from the Renaissance to the modern era. The main objective of this course is to effectively prepare students to take the AP Literature and Composition exam in May, for which students may earn up to six hours of college credit (one semester each of a general writing and literature course).
