Course Description Grades 9-12 Speech

Philosophy Statement: God is the Supreme Communicator and has spoken to His people in many ways. In His goodness, He has gifted us with the ability to read, write, listen, and speak. These language arts are the foundation and gateway to all learning and life skills. Students become life-long learners about God and His Word through the study of language arts.

Course Objective: This course will survey the various types/aspects of communication (i.e., *listening*, *verbal*, *nonverbal*, *intra-personal*, *interpersonal*, *small group*, *public*, *mass*, and *intercultural*), with an emphasis on developing public speaking skills. Students will learn the basic elements of the communication process and the role each of these elements plays in communication effectiveness. Students will also develop their skills in speech preparation and performance competency as they prepare a variety of speeches and present them before a live audience.
